Goanna Walking Track

The 'Goanna Walking Track' was developed after meeting with the community elders.

The walk (1.8 km) starting at the south east side of the Darlington Point bridge rambles downstream along the river finishing at the clay banks, known by the locals as the 'Bunyip hole'.

The Bunyip is a aboriginal mythological creature who lives in deep water. It resembles a large black hairy dog

with long pointy ears, big teeth and howls.

During the 1930s approx 25 families lived along this section of the walkway, however only the bachelors lived close to the Bunyip hole. At the end of the walk, a meeting place with a native garden, red gum table and seats has been constructed to commemorate the significance of the Wiradjuri connection with the river and in respect for the community elders.
